From the Past - Historical Feature

Historical Society to Meet January 13th

The Springville Area Historical Society will meet Tuesday, Jan. 13, at 6:30 p.m. in the SAHS building. A New Year's invitation is issued to everyone who is interested in local history. Thirteen persons attended the Dec.9 SAHS meeting. Dave and Eleanor Kelley presented a large collection of historical newspaper clippings. Rick Heeren donated a sample of very old barbed wire from the Boyanovsky farm. Joe Ruley displayed two old photos taken at the Springville Elevator. One in the office, with a January 1928 calendar on the wall. The other showed three men shoveling grain. Joe hopes to gather more history of the Elevator. Historian Karen Taylor brought a photo of Dr. Arlo Zuercher, who practiced in Springville before World War I. He volunteered for the Army in 1917 and sent to France. His future wife, Grace Deremiah, was in a women's branch of the service in the U.S. Also attending were Bev Franks, president; James Crow, vice president; Jean Schmidt, secretary-treasurer; Doug Beard, Kimball Behning, Wes Bender, Pat Rose, and Duane Schlatter.

Far from Springville, Help for Dying Man

Samuel and Hannah Case Fawley's first four children, George, William, Capitola and Charles, were born between 1866 and 1873 in Springville. William died in infancy. In 1874, the family moved to Napa, Calif., where Dora and Albert were born. The Fawleys returned to Springville in fall 1881. However, California lured George back in 1889, the year he turned 23. He registered to vote in Napa County in 1890. Returning to Springville in 1892, George joined the Methodist Church and Lodge 227, I.O.O.F. (Odd Fellows). In fall 1895, he helped to found Springville's Camp 3347, Modern Woodmen of America. But in December 1897, he went back to California one more time. The 1900 census found him in Salvador, Napa County. Then he moved to Oakland, where he contracted "a slight case of measles" in February 1903. He also caught a cold, which turned into pneumonia. In his hour of need, Odd Fellows lodge brothers were there. They called in Dr. William P. Mauzy and hired two nurses. But George, 36, died Sunday, March 1, 1903. He had insisted that his parents not be told of his illness, so the telegram about his death must have been a terrible shock. His funeral in Oakland was attended by "quite a number of friends, members of the Woodmen of America and Odd Fellows societies." The body was then returned to Iowa by train, and another funeral was held at the Springville Methodist Church March 10. Burial was in the Springville Cemetery. Condolences were sent to George's family by F. L. Gove, secretary of the Oakland Odd Fellows lodge. He wrote, "The members of the Relief committee extend to you all their deepest feelings of sympathy and assure you that our late brother has left us to join the Eternal Lodge above." The letter was published in the Springville New Era.

George Fawley's Siblings

Capitola Emeline (1868-1940) married Bernard W. Gunn, a native of Illinois. They later divorced. **Charles Irwin** (1873-1920) married Belle Calvert, daughter of Asbury "A.B." and Jane Calvert of Springville, and they lived at Coggon. **Dora Agnes** (1875-1938) married W. Harl Gibson, son of Benjamin and Mary Catherine Gibson of Marion. **Albert Chancellor** (1879-1955) married Anna L. Nielsen, daughter of Martinus and Marie Nielsen of Springville, and they moved to Oregon. All the Fawleys except Albert are buried at Springville.

WHEN SNOW FALLS PLEASE REMEMBER THIS!!

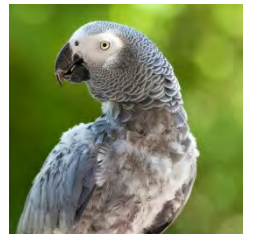


When conditions of 4" of snow or any ice is predicted, imminent, or exist on the traffic surface of the street, please **do not park** your vehicles along any streets. This allows the snowplows and sanders to get through early in the morning.

- ◆ If you must park on the street, please move the vehicles as soon as possible.
- ◆ Do not blow or shovel snow into the street. Pile it in your yard. The snow you place in the street requires another pass from the snowplow and it will just end up in your own driveway when they go by.
- ◆ Also please clear the sidewalks as soon as possible.
- ◆ Finally please be safe during bad weather.

Sam Fawley's Pet Parrot

Samuel Fawley lived on the east side of Fifth Street, north of the creek, and owned a pet parrot, "Poll." She was evidently very tame, as Sam would let her outside. One evening in August 1910, Poll was scared by a child and flew off. It wasn't possible to search in the dark, but the next morning Fawley and his neighbor, John McAtee, began to look along the creek. They called repeatedly, "Where are you, Poll?" The Springville New Era reported. Suddenly there came a cry, "Here I am", and Samuel ran to some small willow bushes and there was poor Poll, wet and hungry. She flew to the shoulder of her owner. Fawley, Poll, and McAtee went home, "rejoicing that the bird had been found."



City Council Minutes - December 01, 2014

Mayor Shebetka called the regular meeting of the City Council to order at 6:00 pm in Springville City Hall. Present on roll call: Brady, Hoyt, Sindelar, and Ralston. Councilman Miller's seat remains vacant after his resignation of October 13, 2014.

Mayor Shebetka opened the **Public Hearing** to Consider an Application for Annexation to the City of Springville. The City has received an application from Rick and Jody Elson for voluntary annexation of land from Linn County into Springville. The public hearing closed at 6:03 p.m.

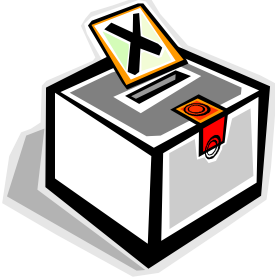

protection against the drifted strain and will continue to protect against the strains already being detected. As more cases of influenza are being seen in Linn County, LCPH is reminding community members that **it is not too late to get the flu vaccine.** Influenza vaccines are still available at Linn County Public Health, many provider offices, and select pharmacies. It is important to protect yourself and those you come into contact with by getting a flu shot each year.

With many people traveling for the holiday season, it is a great time to make an effort to protect yourself and those you come into contact with by getting the flu vaccine and preventing the spread of disease. The spread of disease may be prevented by practicing the 3 C's:

- Cover your cough/sneeze
- Clean your hands often
- Contain yourself at home when ill

The flu is a respiratory illness caused by viruses. The flu comes on suddenly and symptoms may include fever, headache, tiredness, cough, sore throat, nasal congestion, and body aches. Illness typically lasts two to seven days. Influenza may cause severe illness or even death. If you do become ill, it is important to remember that anti-viral medications, such as Tamiflu (oseltamivir) and Relenza (zanamivir), are an effective second line in defense to reduce potentially severe complications. However, the medications are most effective if started within 48 hours of when you become ill. The LCPH clinic (501 13th St. NW, Cedar Rapids) can provide the flu vaccine via walk-in or through an appointment. To learn more information please call **319.892.6065.**

A TRUE STORY

A Grandson of slaves, a boy was born in a poor neighborhood of New Orleans known as the "Back of Town". His father abandoned the family when the child was an infant, His mother became a prostitute and the boy and his sister had to live with their grandmother. Early in life he proved to be gifted for music and with three other kids he sang in the streets of New Orleans. His first gains were the coins that were thrown to them. A Jewish family, Karnofsky, who had immigrated from Lithuania to the USA had pity for the 7-year-old boy and brought him into their home. Initially given 'work' in the house, to feed this hungry child. There he remained and slept in this Jewish families home where, for the first time in his life he was treated with kindness and tenderness. When he went to bed, Mrs. Karnovsky sang him a Russian Lullaby that he would sing with her. Later, he learned to sing and play several Russian and Jewish songs. Over time, this boy became the adopted son of this family. The Karnofskys gave him money to buy his first trumpet; as well the custom in the Jewish families. They sincerely admired his musical talent. Later, when he became professional musician and composer, he used these Jewish melodies in compositions, such as St. James Infirmary and Go Down Moses. The little black boy grew up and wrote a book about this Jewish family who had adopted him in 1907. In memory of this family and until the end of his life, he wore a star of David and said that in this family he had learned "how to live real life and determination."



This little boy was called Louis "Satchmo" Armstrong.

Please make sure each bag you set curbside has a sticker on it. Bags or containers without a tag will be left curbside. Recycle tubs are available at the Clerk's office for **\$14** each. **A special reminder from Marsha at Rudd: Pickup time begins at 5 am, everything needs to be set out before 5 AM, as routes may vary. Rudd does not recycle glass. Glass containers should be placed in your regular trash container or may be taken free of charge to the Cedar Rapids/Linn County Solid Waste Agency.**

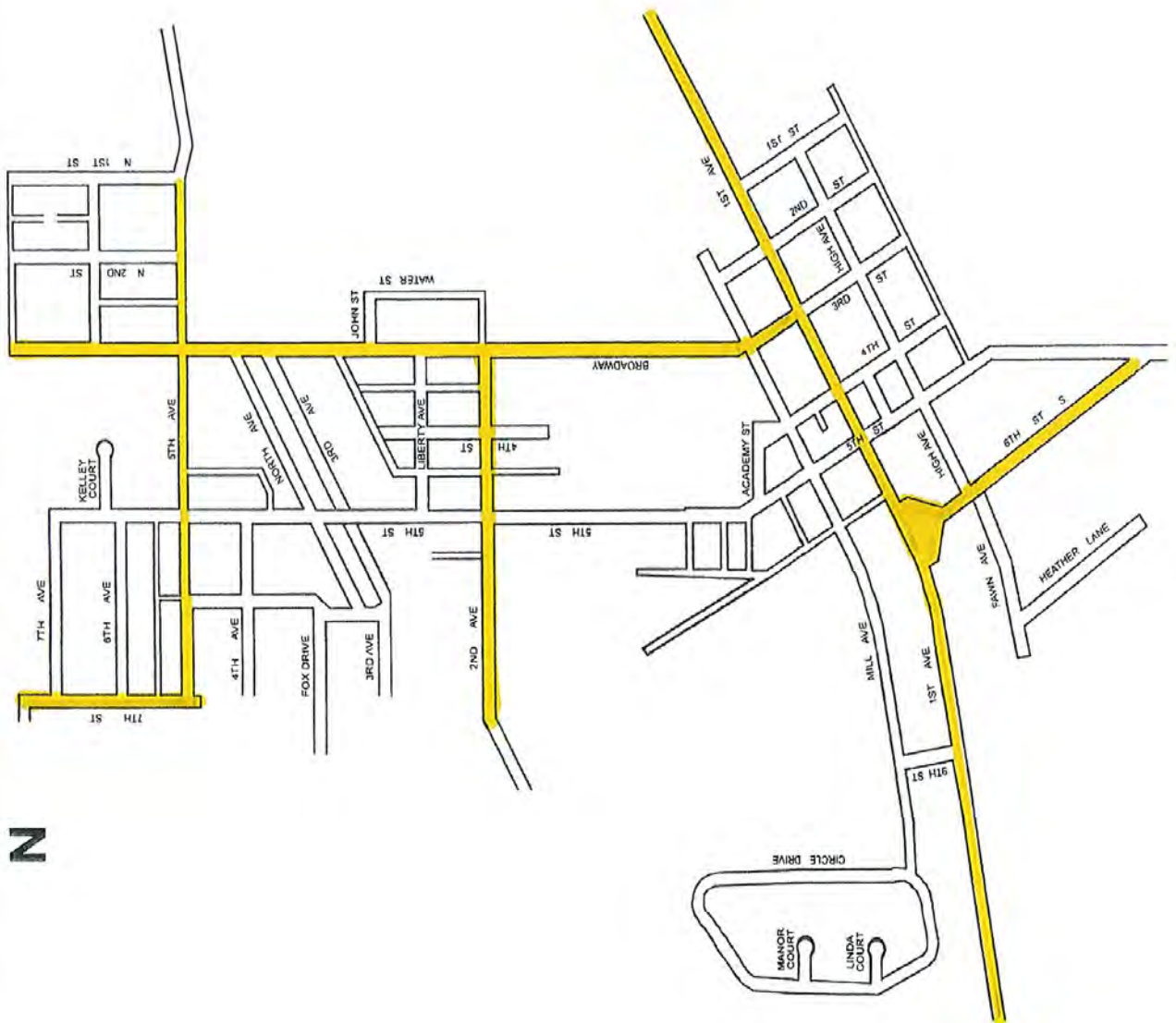
ATTENTION SNOWMOBILERS
